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AMBASSADORS AGREE ON TERMS OF NOTE UPON EVACUATION

Counsel Concludes Consideration of Letter to Be Sent to Berlin Outlining Stand as to Cologne

PARIS, Dec. 27.—(By A. P.)—The allied council of ambassadors today agreed upon the terms of a letter to Germany announcing that the Cologne area will not be evacuated on January 10. This was the date stipulated for the evacuation in the treaty of Versailles.

The text of the letter probably will not be published until it has had time to reach Berlin.

The note will be presented by the French ambassador to Berlin simultaneously, it is stated, the allies thus presenting a solid front to Germany.

Although the outlines of the note were drawn today the document has been distributed to the ambassadors, before the meeting, it was decided that the ambassadors would sign it next Wednesday.

This was taken to mean that Germany will be given the reasons why the evacuation is to be postponed, but the allied council announced that the allied council will remain in the Cologne area.

The ambassadors decided it was unnecessary to settle definitely upon the question of the possible evacuation of the Cologne area.

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Made Gun to Kill Himself, Shot Himself in Heart and Survives to Tell the Story

CHICAGO, Dec. 27.—Max Peck was alive today after surgeons had made a bullet from his heart that fact hardly was less remarkable, his friend said, than the manner of acquiring the missile.

Lonely in a lodging house Christmas eve, Peck decided to end his life. Having no weapon, he constructed a cannon of a piece of lead pipe, rammed home a charge of powder, and for a bullet used a piece of steel pipe. He placed it on a table, pointed it at his heart

and exploded the charge with a red hot wire.

Doctors, who of the house reported to the police that Peck merely had blistered his chest, but an X-ray examination revealed the steel spike in the left ventricle of the heart.
