## MAY HAVE CLUE TO MURDERERS

Albany Gunsmith Identifies Shotgun Used by Shot Captain Youmans

SCHENECTADY, Dec. 6.—For the first time since Acting Police Captain Albert L. Youmans was slain in the resort section of this city a week ago last night, police believe they have a clue to the identity of the slayers and an arrest was predicted some time today. Albany gunsmith yesterday identified the shotgun the slayers used to fire hands made lead slugs into the body of Captain Youmans and today he was expected to come to this city to try to identify at least one of the three men police believe made the slaying.

## HANRAHAN DAMAGE CASE CARRIED TO APPELLATE

## 8 PERSONS TO GO BAIL OF BEAN KING

ALBION, Dec. 6.—Two women were among the eight persons who offered to raise the \$10,000 bail bond of Lewis E. Sands, former "bean king" of the world, held prisoner here charged with larceny. His release will probably be granted by the Supreme Court.

## Justice George A. Larkin opens court at 9 o'clock, at which time 44 indictments recently returned by the Grand Jury will be considered.

The two women, both of Rochester, who have come to the fire in Kittara with a previous arrest, are Miss Helen Kerks, sister-in-law of Mrs. Grace K. Gerks, erstwhile manager for the Sands companies and indicted for forgery, and Mrs. L. Parker. The others are J. G. Simpson, Thomas Paice, Charles Piazzi and Ralph Vink, all of Albion; George and James Sands, of Bergen. The last two being sisters of Sands.

Although these persons are willing to put up the necessary \$20,000 for Sands' release, it was not possible to take him from jail at once, as both Justice Larkin and District Attorney William Munson had returned to their homes. This method of raising Sands' bonds was started and accomplished by the prisoner's attorney, Sanford T. Church, who made a direct appeal to the people of Albion to raise the needed bail by subscription.

## Stiff Sentence Given to Young Driver in Seneca

WATERLOO, Dec. 6.—The stiffest sentence ever meted out in Seneca County Court for a charge of driving a car while intoxicated, and one while County Judge George F. Rodine says will be in vogue in similar cases in the future, was passed upon Walter Clark of Willard, by County Judge Rodine.

Thirty days in jail, a fine of \$300 and the permanent revoking of any and all license to operate a motor vehicle, is the sentence Clark, who is only 18 years old, received. Court suspended payment of the fine upon condition that Clark take a permanent pledge, which he did.

## TEACHER'S PAY UP AGAIN NOW

Repealer Recommendation Adopted by Associated Boards and Trustees

SYRACUSE, Dec. 6.—Revival of the entire question of whether men and women teachers in public schools should receive equal pay for similar service, bitterly contested at Albany last winter until Governor Smith finally signed a bill which would result in a repeal of a recommendation adopted at the convention of the Associated School Boards and Trustees here, delegates predicted today.

Debate which centered about the proposal that the law be repealed came as a climax to yesterday's sessions of the school board representatives. A three hour discussion ended in a vote of 25 board representatives in favor of repeal, six against, and 32 not voting.

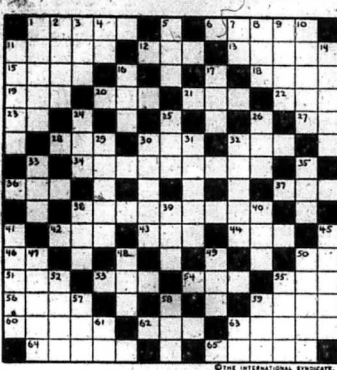
