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CITY'S DEBT HIGHER THAN THAT OF OTHER CITIES OF SAME SIZE

Report for 1922 Shows Rate Much Lower, However, Than the Average; Per Capita Rate is \$76.52

Although higher than many cities of the size of Corning in the state, the public debt of Corning is much lower than the average for all cities of the state.

The per capita debt is very high, however, and ranks with that of Syracuse and Rochester, figures given out by officials of the Department of Commerce disclose.

Corning's net indebtedness in 1922 amounted to \$125,000. This represents a per capita debt of \$76.52, which is much higher than the per capita debt for cities of the United States but lower than New York state cities. The average per capita debt for cities of the state of New York was \$121.23 and for all cities in the United States \$52.65.

Of the upstate cities of the size of Corning, only one, Binghamton, has a lower per capita debt than Corning. Binghamton's debt is \$68.00, the total being only \$521,000.

New York Highest.
New York City had the highest per capita debt of any city in the state, its indebtedness being \$1,250 per capita. Other cities with a per capita debt of \$150 or more were Albany, \$150.00, Buffalo, \$149.00, and Syracuse, \$148.00.

The highest per capita debt for any city of less than 2,500 population was \$150.00, third. Federal officials report, however, that although the per capita debt is high, the average for the state is low. The average per capita debt for all cities in the state was \$76.52, the average for all cities in the United States was \$52.65.
