New Threats of British Rubber Strike

CALL CONFERENCES FOR ALL ENGLISH LABOR LEADERS NEXT WEEK

New Danger of General Coal Strike in England Increased by Effort of Radicals to Spread Movement

LONDON, July 25.—(AP)—The possibility of the threatened strike of coal miners became more serious today when a conference of the transportation and railway unions decided to take steps to prevent the movement of coal in the event the miners strike.

It has been decided to call a conference of all trades unions to decide what strike action, if any, shall be taken by the unions generally.

The present working agreement between miners and owners expires July 31. The miners have called a strike to begin on the date as a result of failure of the two sides to agree upon new work-

ing terms. Yesterday the miners and owners agreed to confer in London Wednesday in a final effort to solve their disagreement. Thus the possibility of sympathetic strike action by other British trades unions in order to assist the miners, seems to hinge upon whether the Wednesday conference is successful.

The executive committee of the Amalgamated Coal Trades Union, which was a former part of the general council of the Trades Union Congress to establish a council of action that will insure that every atom of strength of the organized working class movement will be in support of the miners present crisis.

# State School of Printing at Ithaca Offers Scholarships to Ten Residents of State

With the beginning of its fourth year, the Empire State School of Printing, Ithaca, which has already received several new ideas into the problem of education, has announced a competitive scholarship plan which will go into effect at once. The plan is to award ten scholarships, the value of each \$200 each, to students who, by their ability and earnestness, will help to raise the standard of scholarship. We expect that the competition for the scholarships, which will have a cash value of \$200 each and four with a cash value of \$100 each, will result in keen competition.
