ARMS PARLEY
NEXT LOGICAL
AID TO PEACECoolidge Ready to Summon
Conference if Agreeable
to Other Powers

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—The next step in the evolution of world peace now is a disarmament conference.

President Coolidge stands ready to call such a conference if the idea is approved by other powers.

The League of Nations has been the subject of a disarmament conference, but there is little

doubt that Europe would defer to the wishes of Mr. Coolidge if he were to convene the party soon or that the one scheduled by the League of Nations.

The president has indicated his desire for reduction of armament in several speeches, but has always conditioned his promise on the making of a security pact by the League of Nations.

Mr. Coolidge has said that he would make it possible for public opinion everywhere to approve reduction in military expense with an assurance of safety.

France has argued for a large army on two grounds: Germany's inclination to avoid payment of reparations, and the possibility of German invasion.

Germany has been set in operation answering the first objection, and the Locarno conference at which France and Germany have agreed on the neutrality of the Rhine zone and arbitration in answer to the second objection.

Most compelling of all reasons, however, is the economic situation where Mr. Coolidge, finance minister, is in the midst of a crisis calling either for a levy of capital on the wealthy or intensive taxation of rich as well as poor.

Germany has been forced to begin a material reduction in military expenditure, which would begin to see the way open to a solution of France's fiscal troubles.

PHEASANTS TO BE PLENTIFUL

Hunters Preparing for Opening of Season on Thursday, October 22

Pheasants are reported unusually plentiful in Stuten and Albany counties this year and indications are that hunters will seek the birds when the season opens on Thursday, October 22.

Most hunters can see few of the birds along the state highways in any direction. They are so tame that they pay little attention to the approach of man, automobile or boat. But within a month neither hunter nor citizen will be able to get within shooting distance, so cautious will they have become.

The open season for pheasants is the last two Thursdays in November. The season for partridge opened last week as did the season for woodcock. These birds are not sufficiently plentiful in this section, however, to justify a hunting trip expressly for them.

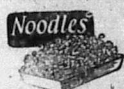
