D'ANDREO IS BEING HELD

To Await Action of Grand Jury as Result of Hearing Here Today

Peter D'Andrea, who has been held at the Bath jail for the past three weeks as being implicated in a holdup of the Pastime Athletic Club, West Main Street, was today held for grand jury action by City Judge Holland.

The adjourned hearing today was for the purpose of taking testimony from D'Andrea, who was previously held on the same charge as being implicated in the same crime. But two questions were raised by the defense attorney, E. J. Carpenter, announced that he had advised his client to stand on his constitutional rights and not make any admissions which might later be used against him.

"Did you have anything to do with the holdup of the Pastime?" asked Attorney King, counsel for D'Andrea. His answer was "No."

Following the daylight holdup three weeks ago, when about \$3000 was taken from Corning men engaged in an all night session, D'Andrea and his co-defendants were arrested after the victims of the holdup identified them as the robbers. Later the police said that Dennis made a confession of his part in the crime in his confession of D'Andrea as the instigator of the crime.

The hearing, which held in the D'Andrea home, was adjourned to the 20th and at that time the defense attorney asked for an adjournment until the trial date for examination. Since Peter D'Andrea was to produce the prisoner without a habeas corpus writ, and this adjournment was granted by Judge E. S. Brown a few days ago.
