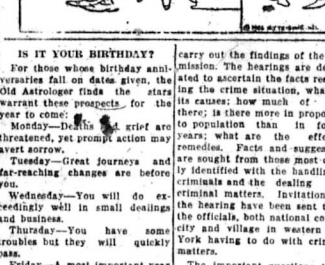

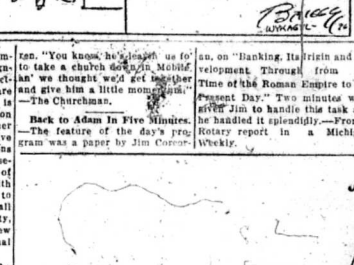

NEW YORK, June 12-(AP)—Godmother to thousands of strays dogs and cats is the role of Mrs. Harry L. Kibbe, president of the In-Lil-Old-New York Association, an organization for the protection of animals.

Mrs. Kibbe has ruled that never, except in the case of innumerable dogs and cats, shall the life of an animal brought to the home be destroyed. And the association, identification tags show, has already cared for approximately 15,000 dogs and about double that number of cats.

Bible-A-Wee Home is located on East 38th street, near the East river. While it is the purpose of the association to find good homes for all the strays, there is one ward for the "pensioners," about a dozen dogs that have gone beyond the ripe canine age of ten or twelve years. The dean of the "veterans" is "Worry," a bright-eyed dog, ten years old.

THE BEST TESTIMONIAL for the home was given by "Blackie," an alert dog, dark and glossy as a newly shined shoe. "Blackie" was placed in a home across the Hudson river in New Jersey. Two days later "Blackie" scratched at the door and yelped his gladness to be back.

He was not sent away again. "Army," one of the 50 canine mascots brought back from France has several shrapnel wounds. Fifty muskets were turned over to a hospital for inspection, but were saved from that fate.

The collection is supported by voluntary contributions, and has a summer home at Waukegan, on Long Island, where the animals can exercise.

# Heavy Hitting Features Nationals; Cornell Crew is Winner

## NATIONAL LEAGUE HITTERS ARE SOCKING PITCHERS; GIANTS LOSE

(By The Associated Press)

Sluggers of the National League are bringing numerous moundmen into the box scores in a thrilling race which finds only a few games separating first and sixth places.

Twenty-four servers of all types and all seasons went into four strategic positions, during which Chicago gained ground by stopping the Boston Braves' winning streak, which had extended to nine straight games.

Smith and Graham permitted the Cubs to hit two of them doubles, while the Bancroft co-terrors could find Jones and Pierce for only seven. Yet Chicago had an uphill battle to win, 7 to 6, gaining the necessary margin with two scores in the eighth.

Russ Wrightson of the Phillies was a hitting way, being responsible for nine runs that his team scored in downing Triple A. He was the only one to show a home run, triple and two doubles in six appearances at the plate. In each of the first three innings he batted in two runs. Altricks, Callahan and Oldham of the World Champions tried in turn to break the record, but while Ulrich, Mann and Willingham were called upon for Philadelphia.

Each club sent five hurriers into the fray at Brooklyn which went

to Cincinnati, 8 to 6, after 11 innings. Rubie Bressler sending the winning runs across with a triple. Jess Petty, whose left handedness has created something of a sensation this season, was the only one to hit 2-3 innings with seven hits off his delivery. Rigby, Lucas, Mays and Enoch scored for the Reds, while Petty was succeeded by McGraw, McWeeny, Ehrhardt and Williams.

The Giants accepted a third straight beating from the St. Louis Cardinals 10 to 2, with Cub serving acceptable throughout for the westerners. Chick Davies, a southpaw, was punished unmercifully in the eighth and the four runs being tallied in each inning.

Wilbur Cooper, former Pirate and Cub, started his first game for Detroit in the American League, but the New York Yankees found him for 10 blows in four innings and he was gone 9 to 0 with Shocker keeping eight safeties fairly well scattered. 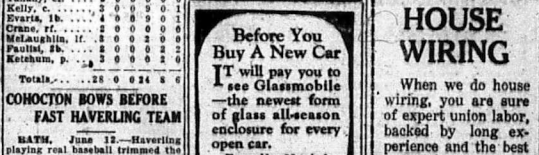
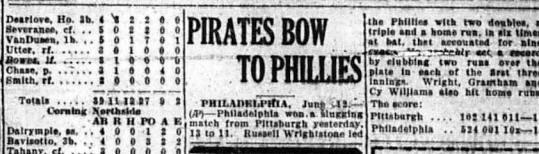

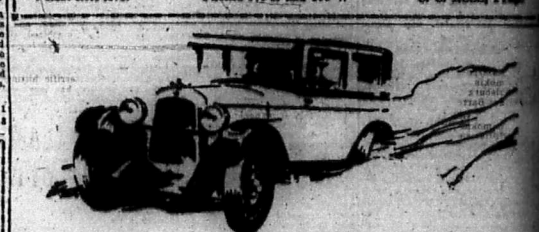
