Academy Regulars Beat Old Grads for First Time in History

C. F. A. VARSITY WINS ANNUAL GAME FROM ALUMNI NINE 5-7

Tim O'Hara Breaks Up The Game of Five All by Rapping Ball in East Half of Ninth Inning with Two Men Down, Scoring Two Runners

In the last of the tenth inning, with the score tied at 4-4, "Tip" O'Hara made a long drive over short stop and brought in two runs, making the first game that the C. F. A. Varsity team has ever won against the Alumni, 7-5.

The game was filled with intense moments, and one would think that it was almost interminable how a pitcher could work himself out of some of the tight places that both Joe Moore and Lloyd Conable were in at times. Conable was still the same old

stand-by for his team, that he was when he played on the varsity. Although not playing before this season, he struck out eight batters in the ten innings.

Moore in the winning side, pitched the same fine brand of ball that he has been hurling all season. He had five strike outs, no walks and allowed eight hits. "Joe" never weakened throughout the entire game, and it was only in the seventh inning that the old grads were successful in collecting more than one hit. They got four during the period. "Joe" made two hit out of four times up.

"Zut" Deffner, was the heavy hitter of the day. He put the ball out of distance for safe hits three times. One of these was a triple. He also brought in two runs for himself out of four times at bat, ranked second in the hitting field.

"Bob" Lindsay turned his same old trick and came out of the game high scorer. He has done this in many of the games that the Academy team has played.

But Hoath, first baseman for the old grads, and Lloyd Conable put over two hits each out of five times up. They were the heavy hitters for the Alumni. Hoath was the third highest man in average for the game. He made one hit out of four times up. Frank made two of the most spectacular catches the bats have made this year. In both of them, he was running at top speed but both times they accounted for put outs.

The game was minus the high number of errors that are usually committed. Both teams had a total of nine misplays, six for the Alumni and three for the Academy.

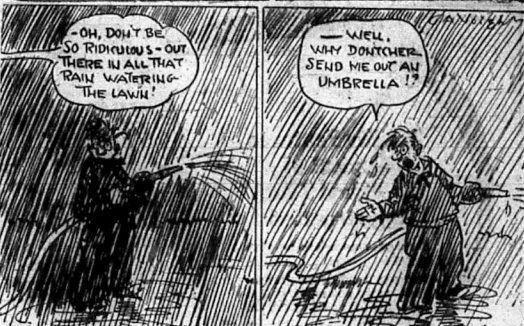

CHURCH IN THE ARCTIC

Every boy and girl goes to church in Hopedale and today we will sit next to the Eskimos in a little church with hard sand floors. Here the good, Moravian missionaries tell of the white man's God. You will hear the Eskimos sing hymns, but I'm afraid mates if you sing in their language you will find yourself gasping for breath.

One word of an Eskimo hymn is as long as a whole sentence in one of our. Not all of the Eskimos believe in God. It is only here, where the missionaries have taught, that the Little worshipers as we do, Sipsop, 1500 miles farther north, knows little of God. He worships strange spirits. Even here, some of the old Eskimo men and women still retain their old beliefs.

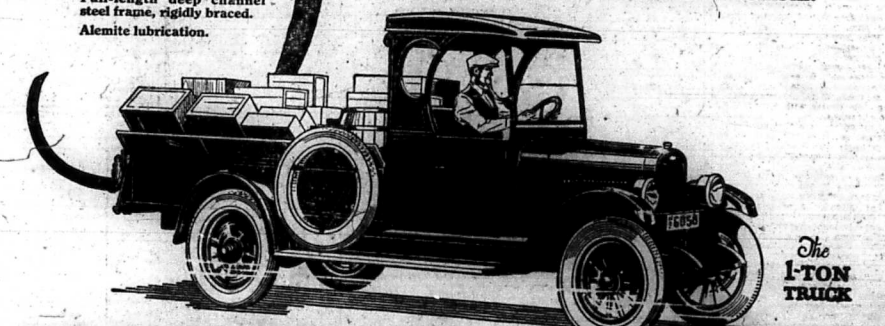

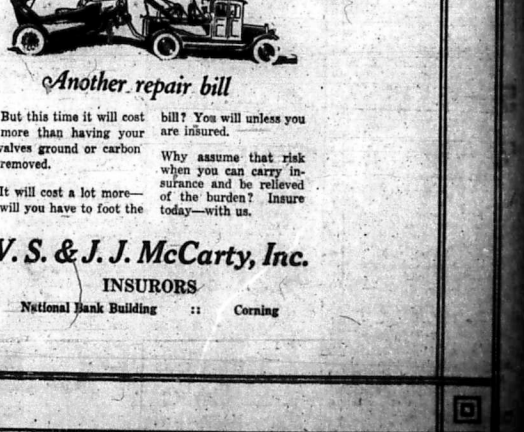
