Hornsby's Cardinals Are Forging Ahead in National League

LEAD BY INJURED MANAGER, ST. LOUIS IS STAGING FINE RALLY; GIANTS DOWNED 6-1

(By The Associated Press) Rogers Hornsby's St. Louis Cardinals appear to be making the sprint designed to carry them to the front in the National League, and Cincinnati, now leading, has given some ground in the terrific race.

Hornsby, aroused to the point where he is fighting the greatest battle of his career, went into yesterday's contest with the New York Giants despite a painful injury to his right eye. A bad blow on a throw from the outfield Thursday did the damage but the manager refused to stay out of the game.

The Cardinals won, 6 to 1. Bill Shelden, left-handed, excellently throughout. Les Bell, St. Louis third baseman, doubled in the third inning to keep his consecutive game streak, now at 15, unbroken. This victory placed the Cardinals only 3-1-3 games behind the leaders.

Philadelphia outbatted the Cubs but went down, 6 to 3, with Charley Root keeping the easterners' hits well scattered. Huber, Philadelphia third baseman, was spilled in the third and had to leave the game.

Fourteen hits off May and Nola gave the Boston Braves a 6 to 2 verdict over Cincinnati. Dave Bancroft leading the onslaught with three singles for a perfect day at the plate. Jack Smith, former St. Louis outfielder, hit safely in four of five trips.

Another exhibition of expert bat-wielding gave the New York Yankees an 11 to 3 margin over the Chicago White Sox. Hank Severid, former Brown catcher, obtained from Washington for the waiver price by the Yankees, did the receiving for his old St. Louis battery mate, Urban Shockley, and hit a double and two singles. Laverie of the Yankees hit a home run.

The Athletics were beaten again by Cleveland, 9 to 3, in their seventh straight defeat. They played poorly throughout, having five errors, while the Indians found Rummel, Walberg, Gray and Pat for 17 hits, all singles. Joe Sewell had four of them. Al Simmons, recently benched for a day for poor hitting, registered a home run in the first and a double later.

The St. Louis pined out 15 hits to stop the fued Sox in ten innings, 6 to 4, the Cardinals also contest between the teams in two days. Rice, McManus and Schang of the Browns collected three hits apiece.

Detroit also staged a hitfest to beat Washington, 10 to 6. The Tigers counted 19 safe blows, five of them for extra bases. Ed Riccio, who had led Cleveland hitters for three innings a few days ago, was not so successful in his second major league appearance. Detroit found the McManus recruit for seven hits in ten innings.

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Stool Tomahawk In Possession of Lock Haven Doctor

LOCK HAVEN, Pa., July 24.—(AP)—A stool tomahawk which may have swung at the belt of a Colonial scout in the battle with the Indians near here 144 years ago, has come into the possession of Dr. T. H. Van Camp, collector of Indian and Colonial relics.

The weapon was found on the grounds of the Clinton County Jail, near the site of the famous engagement with the Indians on April 19, 1782, when Lieutenant Moses Van Camp was killed.

The tomahawk is 8 1/2 inches long, 1 3/4 inches wide at the cutting edge and one-half of an inch thick. Apparently it was an officer's tomahawk, for its unusual features and balance make it unlikely that it belonged to an Indian. Dr. Stewart is of the opinion the tomahawk may have belonged to Van Camp.

The night in which Van Camp was captured took place on the night of the battle of Red Bank. At that time there were 20 or 25 colonial soldiers in command of the fort. The Indians attacked by 800 Indians, who killed nine of Van Camp's men and captured the rest.

Van Camp and his followers were taken to Fort Mifflin. The scout lived for some time after the battle, but died of his wounds.
