DOG LICENSES EXPIRE TODAY

Last Day of 30 Day Grace
Period in Which to
Renew Them

Approximately 100 dogs owned to Corning were still unlicensed today which means that final date on which 1926 licenses can be legally obtained. The office of City Clerk Justice F. Gill is now rushing through the morning of owners who had waited until the last day to secure licenses for their pets.

The 1926 licenses expired on June 30 but 30 days' grace was allowed all delinquent owners. This grace period expired today and next week court summons will be issued for all owners who failed to secure the license. Under the law an unlicensed dog is not entitled to the fact that a dog is without a tag is presumptive evidence that it is unlicensed. Those who fail or refuse to secure a license incur a penalty of \$10 and costs.

If Grange puts much money in this venture he may draw a large part of his quick net profits.

And later on there will never be the big money in professional football that the star can amass at boxing, baseball or golf.

Financial Backing In the way of big money from professional sport boxing leads, golf is second, baseball is third and football may edge in for fourth place.

No other professionals have even approached the money that Louis Armstrong, Fipps, Bernhardt, Stripling and Delaney have pulled in.

Hagner made money last year that Babe Ruth. How? He was paid a big salary for his connection with Florida real estate and golf.

He was a lot of prize money. He was given \$250 a day for every exhibition match. He got something like \$2,000 of the match with Bobby Jones. He gets important money for playing with

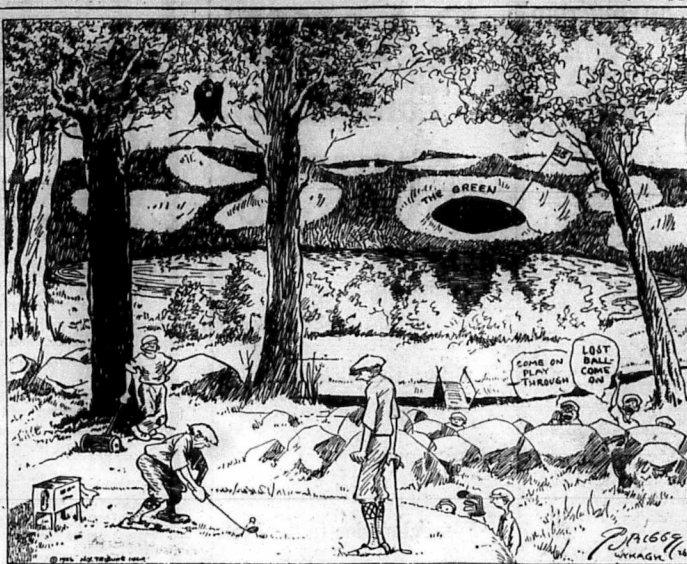

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RECORD CLAIM IS SATISFIED

High Stephens Settles with Ice Company for \$45,000 in Accident

Responsibility for the accident some time ago in which High Stephens, of Canastota, was killed, has been settled. The court has rendered a judgment of \$45,000 against the Erie Railroad Company. The case came to rest at last on the shoulders of the Erie Railroad for \$45,000, according to reports from Hornell today.

Mr. Stephens was employed by the ice company and was thrown from the top of a freight car one night while at work placing ice in the refrigerating compartment when an Erie engine shoved a string of cars against it. As a result of the accident both legs were crushed off.

An action was brought in Supreme Court against the Erie Railroad and Attorney H. A. Hamway, of this city, presented the case for the plaintiff. The action attracted county-wide interest and the jury awarded a verdict of \$45,000, the largest ever given in Herkules County.

The railroad company appealed and the Appellate Division reduced the verdict. The court subsequently was paid. The case was turned over to the Erie company and presented a claim for the amount of the judgment under an existing contract between the two companies. After considerable delay in obtaining a board of arbitration the ice company made an offer of settlement for \$45,000 which was accepted. Under the terms of the contract between the Erie and the ice company the latter assumed liability in connection with accidents at the ice plant in Hornell.

CUMMINS IN DES MOINES

(Continued from Page One)

After a long journey he landed in Des Moines, but soon found that the tales of untold riches easily acquired in that then virgin country were a class with the myths recounted in the books of his school days. He had decided to \$4, he obtained a place in the office of the recorder of Clay county, where he was small and when it became necessary to return him his wardrobe he went into the country where as a carpenter he helped to build a mill, receiving \$1.50 a day.

Later Mr. Hamilton Builder was the express office at McGregory, in Clay county, on the Mississippi. There occurred the illness which changed his whole future. A college friend at Fort Wayne, Ind., offered him a job with a prominent lawyer of Allen county, with many privileges the young man took the job and soon began work as a railroad builder.

He did the job so well that he was called to a position with the Northern Central of Michigan, which he continued for some time. He was engaged in this work that he met the young woman who later became Mrs. Cummings, then Ida L. Gallery, of Eaton Rapids, Mich.

While taking Up Law Study the work on the Michigan road attracted the attention of capitalists who were looking for men by those who were building the Big Grande, Cummins, then Dr. D. E. Mathewson, of Bath, during Dr. Brewer's protracted illness.

It was without his own consent that he broke into politics in 1887 when some Republican bolted their party and named him as an independent candidate for legislature. He was elected and served one term. Five years later when the leaders of the Republican party in Iowa decided to reclaim the state from Democratic rule, he was elected as chairman of the state convention.

Soon afterward Mr. Cummins was elected to his first fight for the United States Senate, but was defeated by a narrow margin. He rallied to his support many young men, and the party divided into Cummins and anti-Cummins elements. On 1891 after a stormy campaign, he was elected governor, a place he held until his election to the Senate.

Investigation Investigator While Governor he started a thorough investigation of railroad taxation, rates, earnings and capitalization and engaged in a long struggle against some of the practices of the rail carriers in this state. On his recommendation the legislature put through the two-cent fare law, the anti-pass law, the short freight rate law, an act limiting hours of road employees and the primary election law.

Senator Cummins in 1874 married Miss Gallery, to whom he had a daughter, Kate, was born. Mrs. Cummins died in February, 1919, and after that time he lived with his two sisters, Anna Margaret Cummins, and C. Cummins, an attorney of Des Moines.

Use of the Iowa state house for a funeral for Senator A. B. Cummins was offered to the senator's family today by Governor John Haworth in a telegram from Yellowstone Park, Wyoming.

Governor Hamill named Lieutenant Governor Clem W. Kimball to represent him at the funeral.
