LACK OF COMPETITION

Dempsey had that the three-year lay-off will not affect him to any extent and that he can work out his speed and his timing in training hours with his sparring mates.
But this doesn't always follow. There is something about competition under pressure that is not to be replaced or made up in any training.
Some time ago Dempsey took a two-year vacation. He ducked the bait from 1924 to 1925. Then he met Tom Gibson. You will hear that this was all prearranged and that Dempsey wasn't training. Then Dempsey was a great actor. But under pressure he was missing constantly, his timing was off and his judgment of distance was a spiral turn.

A little later Dempsey met Firpo. At once he proved that he was before on competition. His first wild rush at Firpo showed not only before he was ready, showed not only lack of judgment but poor aim.

No Substitute
The late John Siddle once said this: "There is no substitute for work."
In the same way there is no substitute for competition, actual competition with a championship at stake.

There is a big difference between playing well when nothing matters much and playing well when the old coronet is hanging in the balance.

It gets down largely to a matter of team play with the brain, the nerves and the muscles.
When the nerves are not under pressure this is simple enough. But when a \$250,000 crown was at stake before a mistake could cost execution isn't quite so simple.

Long, hard training is a necessity. But so is sufficient competition under fire, if one is to hang onto the top branch.

Another Mark to Shoot At
Professor George H. Ruth has already, in the course of his cannonade career, blown himself into the top fifty home runs in two seasons.

He struck off fifty-four one year and fifty-nine another. He may not break either of these high marks, but he has a great chance to pass the fifty-point again, and this will be another mark for future generations of stars to aim at.

It is quite doubtful that any other ballplayer in the next few generations will be able to knock off fifty or more home runs three times.

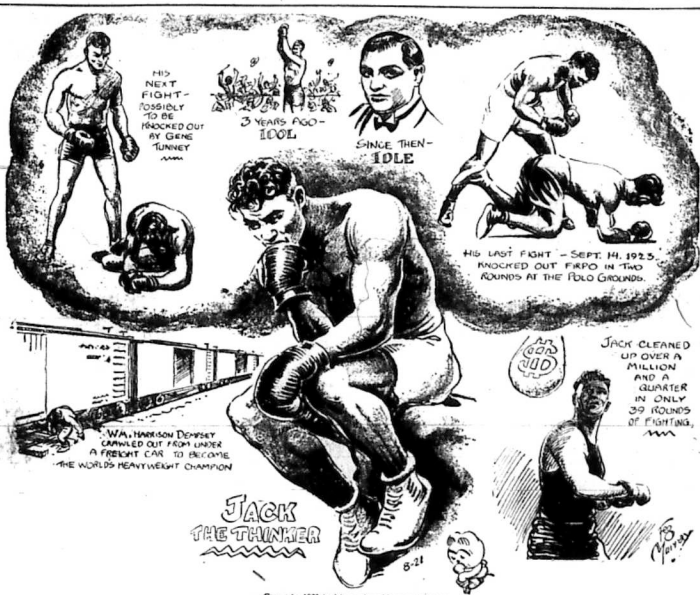
