MICH. CONVICTS DISARMED GUARDS LEAVING DORMS

Prison Authorities are Locked in Cells Formerly Occupied by Prisoners

MIAMI, Mich., Aug. 28.—(AP)—Twenty-five convicts from the Michigan state reformatory here, armed at large today, as a result of a sensational break in the institution.

The plot, which prison officials believed had been in the process of formation for several weeks, culminated early today in a well-organized attack, in which the convicts, all housed in quarters of the institution's dormitories, fell on the guards there, overpowered them, disarmed them and made their way into a rotunda leading off from the dormitory, rushed the guards there, merely overpowering them.

They then charged the administrative office, where additional guards and officials were stationed, and overpowered them, then marched back into the cells formerly occupied by the prisoners and locked them.

Two of the twenty-five convicts who escaped, were recaptured this afternoon in a nearby section, nine miles north of here. The prisoners who surrendered readily to the three prison officers, were given nothing about a plot for a break, but merely walked out when the doors were opened.

Four hundred men were confined at the reformatory, but the escaping prisoners made an attempt to release any others than those in their dormitory. Only two officers of the institution, an old young man, ranging in age from 15 to 20 years, and most of them were released.

A general alarm was sent out and pines were formed at a half past six to assist authorities in apprehending the men.

The alarm soon spread and residents of the district were thrown into a panic when reports that the armed desperadoes were on the loose were received.

About eight of the men fled from the institution in their automobiles, which they seized. The others were reported to have fled into the country.

Hours after the escape, reports were received that some of the convicts had been seen near Lansing. Pines were reported formed at half a mile from Lansing, and the convicts were reported to be in the neighborhood of the city.

The twenty-five men who escaped, were reported to include many of the most desperate criminals housed at the institution.

An officer on duty at telephone booth in the prison office, who was summoned and succeeded in preventing the escape of any of the prisoners confined in the other dormitories.

About fifteen of the convicts later entered a garage on the outskirts of the city, commandeered four automobiles and fled in the general direction of Detroit. The officials, who were in communication with Governor Greenback to obtain guards, were unable to prevent the escape.

A squad of state police arrived early today to assist in the search. The reformatory was absent at the time of the break, and the state police were in Detroit. Deputy Ward Edward Halght was in charge of the institution.

It was reported, assisted by Deputy Frank Leland, who prevented the escape of any of the convicts, that the escape was a wholesale delivery. Summoned by the state police, the reformatory was in communication with Governor Greenback to obtain guards, who were unable to prevent the escape.
