BOSTON BRAVES, NATIONAL LEAGUE TAILENDERS, VANQUISH CARDINALS 11-3

ST. LOUIS LEAD IS CUT TO 2 AND A HALF GAMES OVER REDS; PIRATES BREAK EVEN

(BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS) The rutilant Boston Braves, who knocked the New York Giants out of the National League pennant in the closing stages of the 1935 baseball season, threaten to force St. Louis likewise in the present scramble. The Cardinals lead today by 2 1/2 games with Cincinnati still second and Pittsburgh third, three points apart.

The Braves, languishing at the tail-end of the circuit, were dispiritedly responsible yesterday for the Cardinals' half game loss to the Cincinnati Reds and the Pirates, who spent the day in a futile effort to solve the second place problem decisively. The Braves smote St. Louis lustily 11-3, while Cincinnati and Pittsburgh won games from each other by the same score, 5 to 2.

The threat the Braves offer to the three contenders can hardly be minimized as all three leaders must meet them shortly. Boston has a habit of taking reprisals for its first foreign tour, only to turn upon invaders of their home park with dire results to pennant aspirations. The Cardinals have three more games with the Hubmen, Cincinnati two and the Pirates three. In home games played against this trio this season, just half, or 12 out of 24, better have come the Boston way.

Philadelphia smote the Chicago Cubs, 8 to 4, and broke Guy Bush's record of eight straight victories. The defeat pushed the Braves three games below third place. Deane Sothern, a recruit from the middle Atlantic League, hit a double and a home run in his first appearance as a Quaker. Heavy silence shrouded the Braves' St. Louis lusty 11-3 victory. St. Louis halting the six game winning streak of the Chicago White Sox to 4 to 1 the only game played. The game went ten frames and McCurdy, Chicago catcher, had his record of ten hits in ten successive times at bat broken when he was within one of tying the world record.

But in case the tour is financially
successful it will be in no sense
a victory for professional tennis.
It will be a financial victory for the
dash, skill and personality of one
of sport's most widely advertised stars.

Professional tennis never will
turn anything into a flock of star
amateurs today, whether they are
turning pro. And even then it will
be many years to drum up the
trade. If Tilden and Richard
turned pro next week their financial
trouble would be light. A star
amateur today, whether they are
willing, possibly by writing, can
capitalize his or her fame more as
an amateur than as a professional.

Two great professional tennis
men were known to be better than
all the amateurs might draw a pretty
good crowd. But there is now a
lot of competition in the road.

The Pro and the Amateur
There is no particular reason
why professional tennis shouldn't
come. There is nothing unethical
about it, nothing morally wrong.
The out-of-the-open pro is on a
higher ethical basis than any
amateur who caters in on his reputation
or has his exposure for three
or four months of the year.

The professional game can be called
amateur where expenses are being
paid all over the map week after
week, tournament after tournament.

Quite possibly there is a profes-
sional place for those who want to
make their living out of tennis
unhindered by any amateur re-
strictions.

The living might not be luxu-
rious for some time, but there are
those always willing to take the
gamble if the chance is offered.
The professional side has helped
golf rather than hurt it. And am-
ateur golfers are more likely to
have their expenses paid to tour-
naments. And most of the profes-
sionals also have to pay their own
way.

The Hurly-Burly Month

It's a far cry from Dick Sears to Bill Tilden, but there is a distinct connection between the two, in spite of the vastly different type of tennis played by them and the thirty-nine years that separated their first national championship victories. Richard Sears, the first to win the official title of "Lawn Tennis Champion of the United States," was, like Big Bill, born in the last few years, in a class by himself. He was so far in advance of the other players of his day that he could go out upon the court with a feeling of absolute confidence in his ability to beat them. Tilden has been suspected of having the same confidence.

Dick Sears was the first man in this country to use the volley, he was one of the first to use the overhead service, and after a trip to England, he returned with the famous "Lawford stroke," with which he ran his opponents dizzy. Sears is the only man in United States tennis history to win seven successive championships. William A. Larned won the title seven times, but not in succession. Now Bill Tilden is out to equal Sears' record in the tournament starting Monday at Forest Hills, and what makes it appear that this will be the most interesting and exciting of the forty-five annual contests is that there appear to be three or four players who have a fine chance of knocking the champion from his lofty perch.

Of the sixteen men who have held the title of United States lawn tennis champion, only one, H. I. Doherty, was a foreigner, and he, I believe, is the only one who is not now alive.

The most popular of all the winners was undoubtedly Maurice E. McLoughlin, of San Francisco, called the "Comet" because of his flaming red hair and his dashing style of play. "Mac" was to tennis what Francis Oulmet was to golf, sort of a torch-bearer who popularized a game considered either too expensive or too lady-like for the multitudes. McLoughlin burnt himself out by his net storming tactics, his terrific service, and his slam-bang overhead attacks, but he had a grand time, and almost revolutionized the game of tennis.

What do you think, can William T. Tilden, 2nd, thirty-three, of Germantown, Pa., accomplish what Dick Sears did nearly forty years ago?

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Self confidence and ring generalship are the prime requisites of a pugilistic champion, in the opinion of Jack Dempsey. "Fighting strength and physical condition are, of course, necessities, but mastery of mind over an opponent wins more battles than mere punches and shiftness of foot would lose." The champion delivered himself of this opinion after his workout yesterday in reply to questioning as to what method of battle he would employ against Gene Tunney in their title fight in Philadelphia September 23. Then the champion made a startling statement.

"I always fight the other fellow's way," he said. "I fight it if I'm champion I ought to be good enough to match any style of fighting that is put before me. If I fought in the same manner in each fight some clever fellow would be able to fathom my weak points in that style and beat me. And there are, of course, weak points in any manner of fighting. Therefore I always let the other fellow start something and I try my best to finish it like he started it."

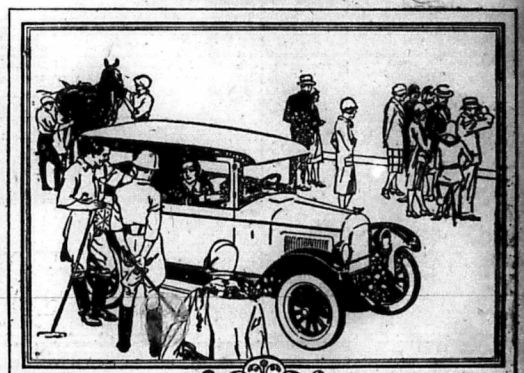
