MEXICO CITY, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Thirteen men have been taken into custody by the Mexican authorities, who are now being held in the city of Huixtla, in connection with the slaying of Jacob Rosenthal, a prominent American citizen, who was killed by bandits forty miles from Mexico City, it was today announced by the Mexican authorities.

Three known bandits were killed when Rosenthal, disguised as a villager, went to their lair outside Huixtla to pay them the \$10,000 ransom which had been demanded. NEWSPAPERS DEMAND FOR TO BROADCAST TANGIER'S FIGHT DETAILS

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Newspapers of the country will NOT be shut out from broadcasting the details of the Dempsey-Tunney fight they receive over the radio from the fight at Tangier, Morocco.

This statement was made today by E. Austin, director of the Associated Press, in a statement to the press.

Mr. Austin, promoter of the fight, had announced that the broadcasting rights would be leased to the Associated Press, but that the fight from their own sources it would constitute an infringement.

With the exception of U. S. Steel, prices of the leaders held above yesterday's low levels, and the entire market soon headed upward as the force of the buying power of Chicago and Ohio was felt. Reports were current that many stockholders might obtain a straight ten per cent. guaranty on their shares in place of the promised five per cent guaranty with a bonus of one half share of Nickel Plate stock.

The closing was strong. Observance of the religious holidays curtailed trading to some extent with total sales approximating 700,000 shares.

Several speculative offerings unsettled the stock market as trading was resumed today, but nickel and copper were limited to moderate fractions.

General Electric, Westinghouse, and International Telephone were active points while United States Steel and General Motors opened slightly higher.

Lower opening prices reflected the marginal influence of yesterday's drastic declines. Considerable forced selling was evident, with recessions of one to two points taking place as pressure was renewed against shares of State Steel, Hudson, General Motors and Warner Pictures.

BOBBY JONES IS WINNER; AMERICAN NET TROPHY IS CAPTURED BY EUROPEANS

VON ELM TO MEET JONES

Blond Haired Challenger To Have Chance To Throne Champion

SHORT HILLS, N. J., Sept. 18.—(AP)—Opportunity today held out to George Von Elm of Los Angeles his third chance to dethrone America's greatest amateur golfer.

He entered the national amateur finals with Bobby Jones, over the sand traps of Baltusrol and in the shadow of two crashing defeats. At Merion in 1924, the blonde haired challenger from the Pacific Coast and the smiling Albatross met in the concluding round of the most dramatic national championship battle ever witnessed. A year later they clashed at Oakmont in the semi-final, and once more Bobby swept to decisive victory at 4 and 6.

Promises of a keener fight was seen today, however, in the impressive performance of Von Elm on the New Jersey links. He has been playing almost as brilliantly as the champion, and yesterday there was only a shade of difference in the medal scores of their semi-final victories.

White Jones was stroking through a decisive match and one under "even fours" to defeat the veteran, Francis Ouimet, five and four, Von Elm was swamping youthful George Dawson of Chicago, 11 and 18, with a sensational string of pars and birdies.

Von Elm has had one of his best seasons this year. He was an outstanding figure in the amateur invasion of British links last year, finishing well up in the British open and participating in a successful defense of the Walker Cup.

NET TROPHY TO GO OVER SEAS

American Tennis Championship Cup Lost To French Net Stars

FOREST HILLS, Sept. 18.—(AP)—America's tennis championship cup was polished up today for its second trip overseas in forty years of competition.

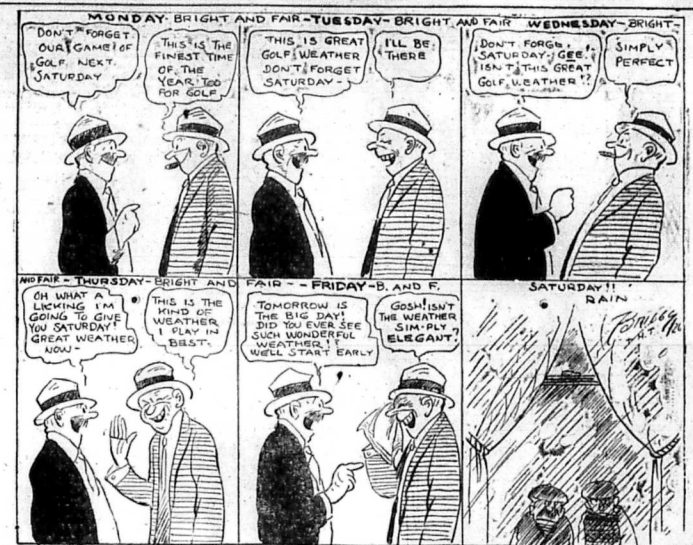
