REACTION TO PROHIBITION ASSUMES IMPORTANCE ON EVE OF BOTH PARTY CONVENTIONS

NEW YORK, Sept. 25.—(AP)—The Empire State's reaction to prohibition assumed major political importance today, on the eve of nominating conventions. Monday and Tuesday of both the Republican and Democratic parties at their respective headquarters in Madison Square Garden here, but the most New York Democrats expected to nominate Alfred E. Smith, potential presidential candidate, and others of a practically selected ticket in Syracuse without much fireworks.

Programs of the two simultaneous nominating conventions have been arranged for the benefit of radio broadcasting stations so that the principal oratorical features will not conflict.

Dry forces expect to make a concentrated attack on Senator Wadsworth at the Republican convention here. Former back Senator Franklin W. Cristman, of Herkimer, has been selected to oppose him for re-nomination. There is every expectation that Senator Wadsworth will be re-nominated, however, and that Mr. Cristman will run as an independent Republican, which might cause the selection of Supreme Court Justice Robert F. Wagner of New York, who will be nominated by the Democrats, and affect the Republican majority in Washington.

Prohibition will not be so much of a factor in selecting the Republican candidate for governor, as dry forces have named two candidates to run on independent tickets. Three men were discussed in political circles today as Republican gubernatorial possibilities, but one of them, Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, has said he does not want the nomination.

Of the other two, William J. Donovan is more acceptable to the dry element, and Ogden L. Mills.

FIREMAN SCALDED TO DEATH WHEN ENGINES TURN OVER NEAR HOLLEY; OTHERS LEAP

HOLLEY, Sept. 25.—A locomotive fireman was scalded to death and the remaining crew of two engines leaped to safety when they leaped from the Falls Branch of the New York Central Railroad crashed head-on into a switch engine last night south of the station here about 3:15 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Both engines were turned over and wrecked, three cars of the fast freight left the track and several others cars buckled up and were demolished. All traffic on the Falls branch was blocked at a late hour tonight as wrecking crews attempted to clear away the debris. Traffic was not expected to be resumed until morning.

Trapped in Oak
The dead fireman, F. J. McLaughlin, 35 years old, of Suspension Bridge, was trapped in the cab of his overturned locomotive. Firemen prevented rescuers from reaching him and it was necessary to place a rope about his body and drag it from the wreckage.

Williams Wickens, 50 years old, of Syracuse, engineer of the greater part of the train, was jumping as did Wm. Vincent Lynch of 615 Garrison avenue, Rochester, engineer of the switch engine and Charles Bender of Fancher, his fireman.

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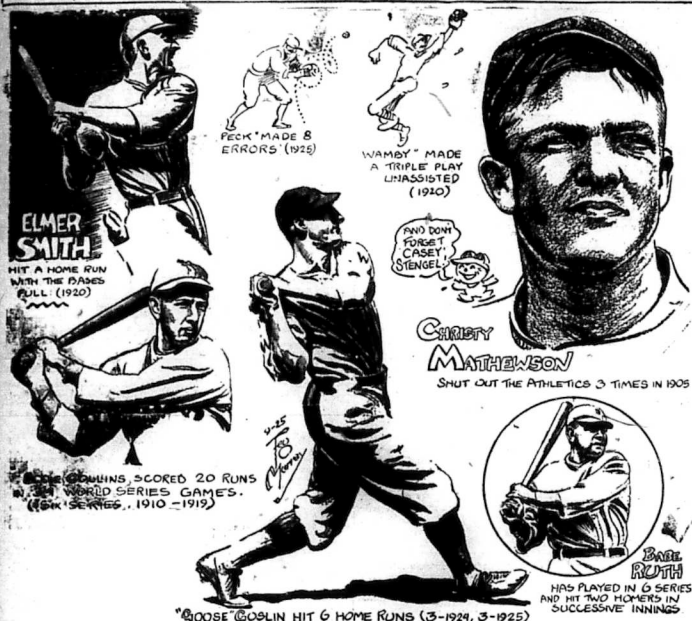
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National League Pennant is Captured by Hornsby's Cards

SOME WORLD SERIES RECORDS

As the 1926 major league baseball season draws to a close, and preparations are under way for the coming post-season games, a brief glance at some world series records should help to while away the time between games.

It isn't always the best known players who make the record performances. Names like Ty Cobb and Tris Speaker occur infrequently in the list of world series records published in that interesting volume, "The Little Red Book," one of Spaulding's Athletics Library. The immortal Ty is down only for "most times stealing home base—1," which honor he shares with Mike McNally and Bob Menzel.

Tris Speaker, the former two-base hit king, is down on the

books for hitting the most three baggers, total series—4, and the most triples in one series—2, which latter record he shares with three others.

Babe Ruth fares better, however, for he holds with "Home Run" Baker, Eddie Collins, Wally Schang, and Everett Scott, the record for playing in the most series—six. (Scotty was eligible, but didn't play for the Senators last year). He also shares with Tommy Leach the record of scoring eight runs in one series. Then the Bambino is tied with Leon Dolgin and Joe Harris for the most home runs in one series—three, and with Harry Hooper for the most homers in one game—two. He holds the record for "most extra bases on long hit, total series—18," and ditto, "one series—12," and "game—6." Then he stands supreme with eight bases

on balls in one series as a tribute to the four in which he was shut out by opposing pitchers, or John McGraw, in 1921. Babe even breaks into the pitcher records with twenty-nine scoreless innings, tied in 1916 and 1918 for Boston.

The name of one grand old veteran fairly emblazons the pages of the world series records. For Eddie Collins, besides sharing the record for most series played in, holds the marks for most runs, total series (20); most bases hit, total series (42); most singles, total series (43); most total bases, total series (53); most sacrifice hits, total series (8); and most stolen bases, total series (14).

Christy Mathewson's name dominates the pitching performances, for, besides his twenty-seven scoreless innings against the Athletics in 1905, he pitched four

shut-out games altogether, pitched the most innings, total series (103 2-3); and one series, 25 2-3. "Biggie" also shares with Plank, Marquard, and Joe Bush the record for most defeats, total series—11.

Other interesting performances are Art Nehf's walking thirty-one batters in four series, Carl Mays' feat of pitching three full games in one series without passing a strike, and Ed Walsh's striking out twelve in one game. 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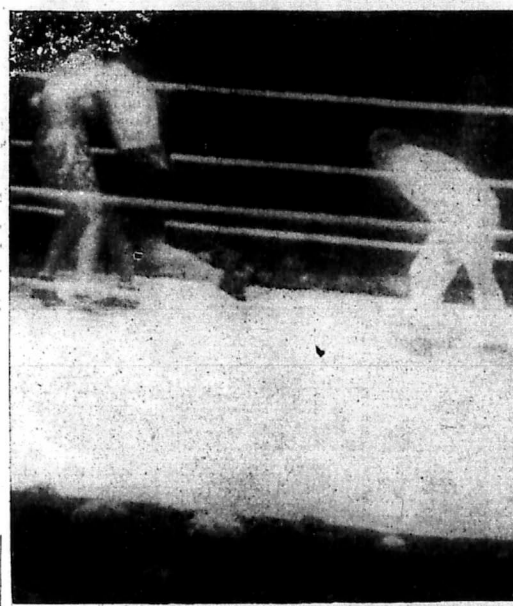

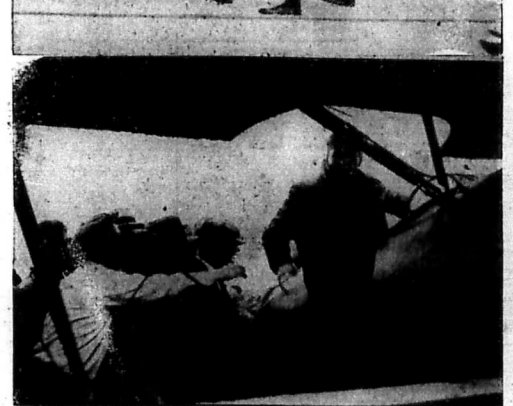
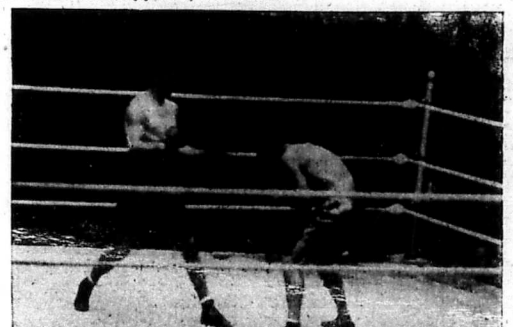

PROF. MARVIN COUSIN OF MAYOR ROOD WAS KILLED BY ESKIMO

Cornell Educator Killed While With the Peary Expedition Not Drowned as Believed for Last 17 Years

Professor Ross Marvin of Cornell University and a cousin of Mayor Harry A. Rood, was believed for 17 years to have been drowned on the Peary expedition to the North Pole, but a copy-righted dispatch to the New York Times discloses today that he was murdered by an Eskimo, according to The Associated Press today.

The dispatch is from George Palmer Putnam, New York publisher, who arrived at Sydney, N. S. W., last night on the schooner Morriston, from an expedition to Greenland.

Kudluktook, the mayor, made a voluntary confession after being converted to Christianity, Mr. Putnam says.

Marvin, Kudluktook and an Eskimo named Inuktook, but called Harrigan by white companions, set out from the steamer Roosevelt as Peary's third supporting party when he started his expedition. They left Peary at latitude 84 degrees 38 minutes to return to the ship.

They were three or four days from their farthest north. He went ahead with Marvin to search for the best out trail. Harrigan remained with the dogs. The paths of Harrigan and Kudluktook were followed.

Word reached Mrs. Ella Rood, of First street, Painted Post, mother of the present mayor of Corning, and cousin of Prof. Marvin, September 8, 1909, telling of the death of Ross Gilman. Marvin on April 10, 1909, 45 miles north of Cape Columbia.

Prof. Marvin was second in command of Commodore Peary's expedition and was declared by Peary to be his most valuable assistant.

It was previously rumored that Prof. Marvin was murdered, this was just as consistently denied. Commodore Peary frequently stating that the Eskimo with Mr. Marvin had declared that accidental drowning was responsible for the death. This theory was held as the truth until today when the Eskimo's confession revealed the truth to the world.

Ross Marvin was born in Elmira, January 28, 1850, the son of a farmer. While in Elmhurst he became acquainted with L. C. Brown, who had been a member of one of Peary's Arctic expeditions and through this friendship, related Mr. Marvin's meeting with Commodore Peary.

How The Evening Leader Pictured the Big Fight

The manner in which The Evening Leader pictured the heavyweight championship fight at Philadelphia is an admirable example of up-to-the-minute journalism.

Pictures were taken care of by our New York service. One of the pictures of the fight was rushed from Philadelphia to New York, cuts made and mailed out. The picture was New York, reaching this city at 4:30 o'clock last night, just too late for yesterday's edition, but in time for publication today.

Prior to setting out with the great explorer, Mr. Marvin went on the St. Martin's nautical school under the supervision of the New York City Board of Education.

Mr. Marvin's mother, Mrs. Mary J. Marvin, still lives in Elmira, residing at 706 Riverside avenue. A brother and a sister, William S. Marvin and Albert E. Marvin, reside at the same address. Another brother, Albert E. Marvin, resides at 313 Walnut street, Elmira.

Since the death of Mr. Marvin, the city of Elmira has erected a boulder, specially inscribed, at the corner of Lake street and Union Place, in honor of the high esteem in which he was held by the citizens of his native city.

ELMHURST, Sept. 25.—(P)—We accept the report of Commodore Peary as accepted by the Geographical Society of the World, which was the laconic statement of members of the late Ross G. Marvin's family, following the published article in the New York Times today that Professor Marvin had been murdered by an Eskimo while a member of the Peary expedition to the North Pole.

Professor Marvin of Cornell University was a native Elmira; his mother Mary J. Marvin, sister Lillian Colver and brother William and Albert Marvin still reside in this city. Mrs. Marvin, who will observe her 56th birthday next week, was married to Prof. Marvin in 1878.

The published article today had joined with other members of her family of holding it in doubt. Ross Marvin was the only member of the Peary expedition to lose his life on that party.

He was in advance of the Eskimo returned to the ship and been dropped.

Commander Peary's published books describe the death as accidental and that report was accepted by Geographical Societies of the world and although the reports have since been published with little or no faith.

During the 17 years since the news of the death reached this city and was conveyed to the members by a Star Gazette reporter, the family has become reconciled to the belief that death was accidental.

While in Elmhurst he became acquainted with L. C. Brown, who had been a member of one of Peary's Arctic expeditions and through this friendship, related Mr. Marvin's meeting with Commodore Peary.

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WIFE AND CHILD OF FORMER CORNING BOY KILLED IN FLORIDA

Mrs. Harland Kimball and Baby Reported Dead at Kelsey City; No Word of Fate of Mr. Kimball

Jane, wife of Harland Kimball, former Corning boy, and their two weeks old babe were victims of the terrible hurricane that swept through Florida last week, according to information reaching the city. The names appeared among the dead from Harland and no communication was received until Ernest H. Kimball, a former Corning photographer who is now visiting at Westfield, Pa., received a telegram from the city announcing the death of his wife and baby.

E. H. Kimball, father of Harland Kimball, was a well known photographer and lived about 12 years ago. He moved his family to Florida and they have since resided at Kelsey City, in the vicinity of Miami. Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Kimball have been spending the summer at their former home in Westfield. Two of Harland Kimball's children have been reported with their grandparents or they too, would probably have been included in the casualty list.

When Harland Kimball was included in the casualty list, he was not specified. He was believed to be in the Philippines for three years. The Standard Oil Company and there met his wife, charming of the English girl living in that young after their marriage they moved to Florida and Harland had been employed for two or three years as civil engineer by the East Coast Finances Company.

His home as well as that of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest H. Kimball, is at Kelsey City, but he has been engaged in survey work and had a house built, which was anchored up at Hallandale and a month later he was there with him when the storm came. The section was badly flooded and while details are lacking it is supposed that the house boat was wrecked during the storm.
